## CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

Dear Grangers,

I am recovering from my recent surgery that happened on May 17th. I had a brain tumor removed. The tumor was discovered on April 14th after I passed out at work. I thank God every day because when I passed out, I hit my head on a beverage cooler and that was the reason that the ER did a cat-scan and discovered the mass.

I was only at KU Med Center for 3 days. The tumor was benign with a Grade 1 biopsy. Which means NO radiation or Chemo. I will have to have MRI's for probably the rest of my life. It was really scary, but God had me in His hands the whole time. So for now I am doing my best to get my strength back and balance. I still have a few vision problems, but they are slowly returning to normal. I am still receiving Physical Therapy and my doctor thinks I can return to work on September 1st with few restrictions (that I don't know if Walmart can do). I have been told that I have to sit down if needed and I cannot lift or carry anything that is

more than 10 pounds. That has been reported to the company that these


## **GRANGE UPDATES**

During Grange Week, Bayneville Grange was one of three Granges who took part in a Zoom call focused on Community Service, headed by Pete Pompper, National Grange Community Service Director. It was a time for sharing what works in various Granges across the nation and we were honored to be a part. We shared specific items our Grange takes pride in and some are included below:

Bayneville Grange #1810 is small, but all participate in one form or another, including the three Junior Grangers and the "JG Wanna Be but only is 3 years old." We always have three generations involved. The oldest generation is helping teach the youngest generation how to make Grange peanut brittle the old fashioned way, by string and sight, not a thermometer. This is our biggest moneymaker each year, allowing us to purchase hundreds of dictionaries for elementary schools. Likewise, older members are teaching younger members how to sew and guilt to help in the creation of Quilts of Valor quilts for Servicemen and weighted blankets for special needs children at Rainbows United. Juniors are making food tray cards at the holidays for local Veterans hospital and making and donating Birthday Cake kits for the local Caring Center. Every child needs a birthday cake and the Juniors are doing their part to see this happens. The kids helped in planting the butterfly garden for the community's Senior Center Center where our meetings are held. They drew and colored placemats for the Irish Stew Dinner held to make a donation to our town's new Veterans Memorial Monument. Not only are our youngest members acquiring skills from those older, but they are experiencing 1st hand what it means to do these things not for their benefit but for the benefit of others.


